I will welcome all information that will help document this history in detail.

Note: To date the only explanation that I can offer regarding the mixup on parentage of "East" Samuel Woods (who married Anna Purviance, spelled "Prevince" in Woods-McAfee Memorial) is that the present "older generation" as children listened to the family stories told at the Woods family reunions and got them somewhat mixed up over the years.

The "West" Samuel Woods family married into the "East" Samuel Woods

family after the two families arrived in Benton County, Arkansas. And it is quite possible that the two families were already related. "East" Samuel Woods was born in North Carolina. "West" Samuel Woods was born in Georgia. His father, Francis H. Woods, was born in North Carolina. There was a Capt. James Woods who left North Carolina after the Revolutionary War and who settled in North Georgia. It may be that he is the father of the James and Francis H. (Frank) Woods who were born in North Carolina, moved to Georgia, where their children were born, and then moved to Bedford County, Tennessee and settled on Rock Creek.

Both John and William Woods, sons of Capt. Samuel Woods and brothers of "East" Samuel Woods, lived for a time in Bedford County, Tenn., and their land was also on Rock Creek.

The name James crops up constantly in the "West" Samuel family history. It is almost completely missing in Capt. Samuel Woods list of children and grandchildren, (those whom I have been able to locate).

The Woods Family fortune that Mr. S. D. Woods speaks of, I believe belongs to the Dickson-McEwen family (from which he is also descended), and the story can be found in a printed and published book on that family.

Since descendants of both "East" Samuel and "West" Samuel attended these family reunions it seems quite possible to me that their traditions blended in the telling over the years and finally came out as "Capt. James Woods - father of Samuel Woods, grandfather of Samuel Purviance Woods and William H. Woods and David Woods.

Some day soon I hope to carry my research into North Carolina on the earlier years of Capt. Samuel Woods and perhaps I will finally find out the name of his father.

CAPT. SAMUEL WOODS

of King's Mountain

Family tradition regarding Capt. Samuel Woods varies so greatly from one branch of his descendants to another, that it is most confusing and has caused the writer untold hours of time wasted in looking for records where tradition said they were, only to find that tradition in that instance was altogether wrong.

There was also confusion among the great grandchildren of Samuel and Anna (Purviance) Woods, whom I talked to and corresponded with, in the years 1960-63 (and whose ages ran between 80-93), as to the name of Samuel's father and where he lived. Some insisted that Samuel's father was a Capt. James Woods who came from Virginia to Ft. Nashboro and later settled in Georgia where he died in 1825. Others insisted that Capt. James came from North Carolina to Georgia and was never in Tennessee, although several of his sons came to Tennessee.

One grandson of Oliver Woods in Lawrence County, Missouri, insisted that his great grandfather was named John Woods. (It was printed that way in Goodspeed's Hist. of Southwest Missouri).

After ten years of painstaking work, carefully combing the North Carolina, Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri and Arkansas records, I have the following brief family history that can be documented.

In a book written by LeGrand M. Jones, published in 1894, called "Family Reminiscences" I find on page 43 the following: "Samuel Woods' father came from Ireland to North Carolina. Judge Gideon B. Black, now of Trenton, Tenn., a grandson of (Capt.) Samuel Woods, to whom I am indebted for the facts relating to Samuel Woods and his children, is not certain whether Sameul was born before or after his father left Ireland. I have not been able to learn the name of Samuel Woods' father, or the date of his immigration to this country."

Rev. Hervey Woods, son of John Woods and a grandson of Capt. Samuel Woods, kept a "Journal" during his life time. Here is an excerpt from that journal: "My grandfather, Samuel Woods, came from Ireland when he was eight years old. My grandmother Woods was originally Margaret Holmes, descended from that adventurous Holmes that made first settlement in Georgia under Gen. Oglethorpe. My father, John Woods, and my mother (originally Charity Dysart) were born in North Carolina, and reared in Kentucky principally. My father was born in North Carolina in 1774. When he was 6 or 8 years old his father moved to Kentucky and at a time when the Indians were troublesome. He settled at Paint Lick in what is now Garrard County. My father's oldest brother was killed by the Indians. My father was married in 1799. In the autumn of 1801 he moved from Kentucky to Wilson County, Tennessee, on Smith's Fork. In autumn 1807 he moved to Bedford County, Tenn. to a place on East

Fork of Rock Creek, one mile north of the Big Spring, now Farmington."

In a search of Rowan County, North Carolina, marriage records, I find the following marriage is recorded: "Samuel Woods to Margaret Holmes, Sept. 29, 1768. Margaret daughter of John Holmes."

Draper: King's Mountain and Its Heroes, p. 474. "Samuel Woods served as a captain in McDougalds Corps and commanded a company at the Battle of King's Mountain." In some of the records the name is spelled Samuel Wood.

Shortly after the close of the Revolutionary War, Capt. Samuel Woods moved his family from North Carolina to what was then Lincoln County, Kentucky, now Madison County. The move was made about 1782-3 for the 1860 census records of Lawrence County, Missouri, show that Oliver Woods was born in Kentucky ca. 1783-4 as the census lists him as age 67 in 1850. Oliver Woods' date of birth as given in Goodspeed: History of Southwest Missouri, was Oct. 15, 1784 at Boone's Fort.

Samuel Woods, son of Capt. Samuel, was born in North Carolina Feb. 17, 1776. If dates can be obtained on the births of some of Capt. Samuel's daughters we may be able to determine the exact year of his removal to Kentucky. This date from tombstone, Woods Cemetery, Benton County, Ark.

In the State Records at Frankfort, Ky. is the "record of a grant for 350 acres of land in Lincoln County, on a branch of Paint Lick Creek, adjoining the lands of Brooks, Kennedy, Bett, McCormack, Miller, and McNeely. The warrant was numbered 3406, and bore date March 6, 1780. It was originally issued to Jesse Cartwright, who assigned it to William Miller, who assigned it to Samuel Woods. The date of the survey of this tract was May 3, 1783, which is the year, most probably, in which this Samuel Woods came to Kentucky. The patent for the land bears date December 2, 1785, and is signed by Governor Patrick Henry, of Virginia. This Samuel Woods was, beyond all reasonable doubt, the one who was an elder in the Paint Lick Church for about fifteen years, and then moved to Williamson County, Tennessee, about the year 1800". p. 148 of Woods-McAffee Memorial:

Samuel Woods "figured in several real estate transactions; one in May, 1783, as set forth" (page 148) which see; the others in July 1796, as shown by the Madison County records. Garrard County was that same year carved out of portions of Lincoln, Madison and Mercer Counties. The stream called Paint Lick Creek is almost wholly within the county of Madison, but the village and the Presbyterian Church of Paint Lick are located immediately on the Garrard and Madison line. This Samuel Woods was an elder in that church for at least fifteen years, or longer. He on several occasions represented the Paint Lick and Silver Creek Presbyterian churches, the first named of which was organized in 1784. March 30, 1785, a Conference of Presbyterian ministers and elders was held at the Cane Run Presbyterian Church in Mercer County, a few miles east of Harrodsburg; and at this gathering Samuel Woods represented Paint Lick Church. (Davidson's History of Presbyterianism in Kentucky, pages 73-82.) As a result of this Conference the Presbytery of Transylvania was organized

in the fall of 1786. In October, 1789, when the Presbytery met at Cane Run Church, this same Samuel Woods was present as the elder from Paint Lick and Silver Creek. In October, 1794, he represented Paint Lick at the Presbytery which convened in his own church; and then in 1797, when it met at Stanford. In about the year 1800 he moved with his family to Williamson County, Tennessee. Mr. Le Grand M. Jones, of Trenton, Tenn. published a little volume concerning the descendants of this Samuel Woods, Mrs. Jones, his wife, having been descended from him; and upon this book the author has drawn for a list of Samuel Wood's children, and for several other items of information." (page 83 of Woods-McAfee Memorial).

"The lady who was the wife of Samuel Woods of Paint Lick while he was in Kentucky was, beyond question, his first wife. Her Christian name, as the Madison records prove, was Margaret; and Judge Black positively states (quoted by Mr. Jones in his Reminiscences) that her surname was Holmes. Samuel had born to him ten children, all by his wife, Margaret Holmes, as follows: (a) Oliver, who was born about 1764,* and was killed by Indians" (*see marriage record date of 1768 - L.W.B.); "(b) Martha, who married John Dysart, by whom she had two sons and two daughters, one of the sons being named John; (c) Jane, who married John Herron, and by whom she had one daughter and three sons, the daughter marrying John Dysart, her cousin, and the sons being named John, William and Frank, respectively; (d) Margaret, who married Thomas Black Aug. 20, 1793, and by whom she had twelve children, the youngest of whom was Judge Gideon B. Black, b. Feb. 4, 1846; (f) Samuel, who married Ann Prevince; (g) David, who married a Miss McLargo, by whom he had several sons who moved to Arkansas; (j) Daniel T., who married a Miss Reese, by whom he had several children, among whom was a son named Leroy, who was a distinguished Cumberland Presbyterian minister; (k) Oliver, named for the first son of this name who was killed by Indians, as stated above; and (l) Polly, (Mary) who married John Holmes, by whom she had several children, among whom were sons named John, William and Samuel, respectively." (pages 85-86 Woods-McAfee Memorial).

Both Judge Black and Mr. Jones failed to mention William Woods as a son of Capt. Samuel Woods and his wife Margaret but this can be proved by the will of William Woods which can be found on page 26 of the Carroll County, Tenn. Will Book 1822-1864. The will was dated 12 Nov. 1831 Carroll Co., Tenn. Proved at Dec. term of Court 1831. In it he lists his wife Nancy Woods; at her death the slaves and their offspring to be equally divided amongst the children and grandchildren of "my brother John Woods, my brother-in-law Thos. Black, my brother-in-law John Holmes, but more especially between John Woods' son William, John Holmes' son William and H. Woods' son William, Samuel Black's son William, L.S. Woods' daughter Nancy, Dysart Woods' daughter Nancy Rachel, the above named property shall be divided among the above named persons, by one son of John Woods, one of John Holmes and one of Thomas Black and my wife Nancy Woods. Silvinas to be divided between Wm. W. Herron and Nancy Herron.

Mentions Margaret Woods, daughter of John, his brother.
Mentions John Woods and his son L. S. Woods
Sister Martha Woods and her son John Dysart
John Steele that married Nelly Black
Nancy Herron, wife of John Herron, Hervy Woods, Levi S. Woods, Oliver Woods by brother and his family.

(It is now known why he left out his brother Samuel and Samuel's family in this will, unless he felt that Samuel had already gotten more from Capt. Samuel Woods than the other children had gotten. L.W.B.)

Capt. Samuel Woods was living in Williamson County, Tenn. in 1807 when his son Oliver Woods married Nancy Haynes Dec. 1, 1807 and his daughter Polly (Mary) was married to John Holmes Dec. 14, 1807.

In the Williamson County, Tenn. Court Minutes Vol. 1, Part 1, p. 85 dated Jan. 1804, "Ordered that Isaac Crow oversee the clearing out and keeping in repair that part of the public road leading from Franklin to Burfords Ford on West Harpeth that lies between the first small knob south of Maj. Porters and said Ford and that Samuel Woods, William Woods, Oliver Woods, John Dysart, etc. work road under his direction."

Capt. Samuel Woods moved to Carroll County, Tenn. in 1820 to live with his son Samuel until his death about 1825. His son Samuel bought land on Ready (or Reedy) Creek. His farm was about where McLemoresville, Tenn. stands today. A check of the Ferguson and Providence cemeteries in Carroll Co., Tenn., where a goodly number of Captain Samuel's children and grandchildren are buried, has failed to show his grave. He may lie in one of the many graves that are marked only by rough field stones. Or he may be in an unmarked grave on the land that his son Samuel owned. Since this Samuel moved to Benton County, Ark. in 1832 and the land has changed hands many times the grave may be entirely lost to us who seek to find it. Descendants still living in Carroll Co., Tenn. do not know his place of burial. To date (1965) the writer has not been able to find any material that makes reference to his place of burial.

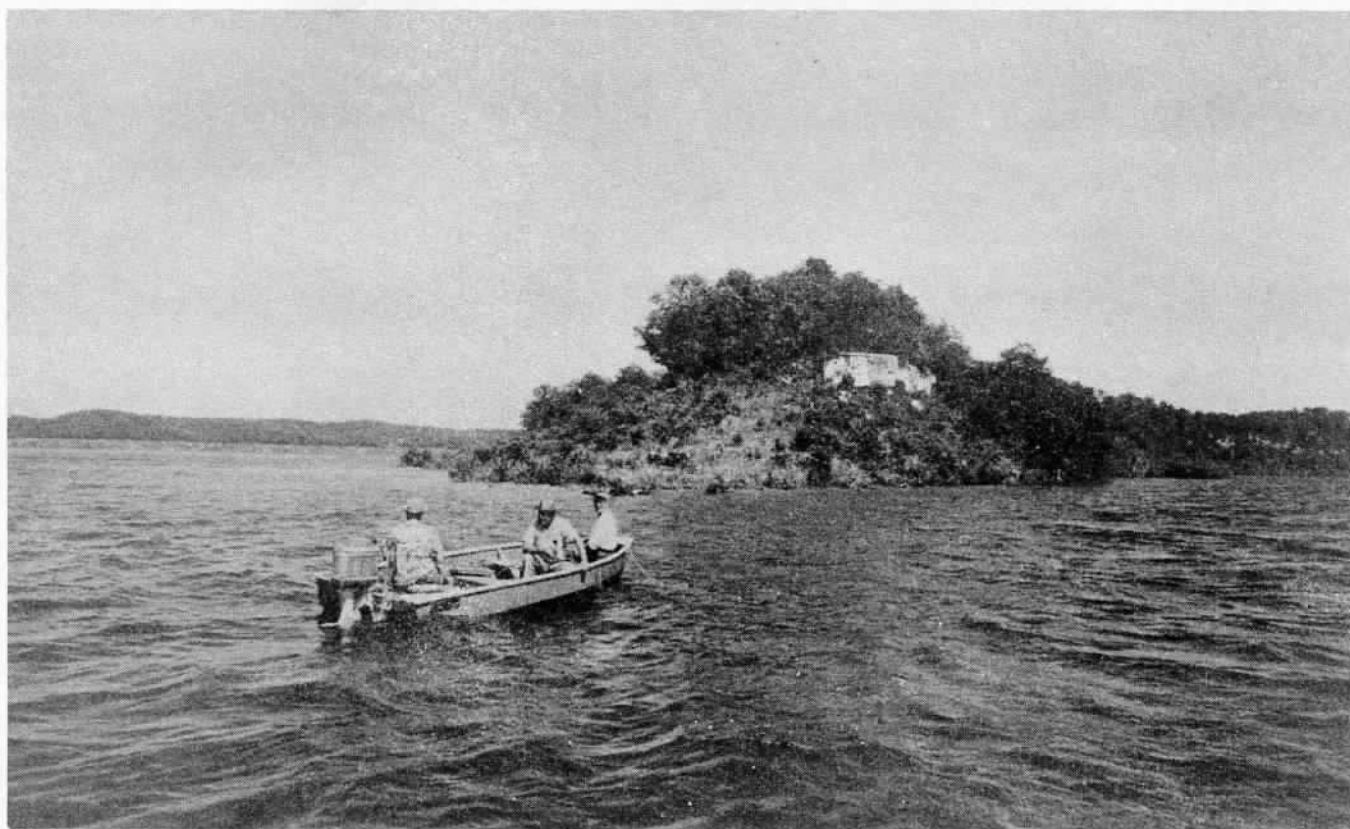
We are presently in the red - so please continue your support. We try to do a good job and are frequently told we do.

The passing then of Judge Lemley was received with great sadness by all of us who knew him best, as those who knew him, regardless of class or rank held him in great esteem and thus cherish memory of him. As positive evidence of his excellent character and unquestionable integrity and honor, those who knew him best, loved him the most. He was a foe without hate, a friend without treachery, a Christian without hypocrisy, and a man without guile. One who would never compromise with wrong.

As a man among men, with all classes he was always the same Judge Lemley. He never swerved from his inborn noble principles of honesty of purpose, nor from the right way of thinking and doing things. His nature would not let him blow hot and then blow cold for he hated with an inveterate hate, hypocrisy, false show and dishonesty. THE B. F. HOBBS ACCOUNT BOOK
1881

Old account books can very often tell a part of the story of a family that may now live only in the fond memory of grandchildren. We were recently given the pleasure of scanning through the account book of B. F. Hobbs who started a nursery near Bentonville in 1881. We see here a determination to do things in a business-like manner from the many entries, viz.

The account book cost 35¢ and would cost no more today. The entries are in fine script telling us that Mr. Hobbs was well educated. One's handwriting in 1881 was important and good writing a "must". There are no sales entries, which reminds one that no person can start a nursery one week and begin selling the next week. It takes years to put a nursery on its feet, and have it pay. The entries by Mr. Hobbs are only during 1881. Only his descendants can know what took place between 1881 and 1890 when Mrs. Hobbs seemingly took over with many pages of items dealing in the main with the running of a household. We hope some time to have the Hobbs family story for some future PIONEER. The entries by Mrs. Hobbs are also written in a fine manner. A few taken at random are:

The rent payments were regular at times two months in advance - \$10.00. Sickness hit hard for there are many calls recorded by one doctor, then another, every other day. The charge looks like \$1.50 per call. We see many items of \$10.00 payments to the doctors. The doctor bills seem to have been much more than the funeral expenses. There seems to be but one medicine item so we assume that the doctors supplied some medicine. School books cost a lot. The account book has 18 biblical questions with answers and citations. This too speaks for itself as do a number of entries about trips by a Hobbs boy to and from Monette, wishing or thanking for a safe journey. Old records are indeed very interesting. Wish we could have more of them.

CAPTAIN SAMUEL WOODS

OF KINGS MOUNTAIN

(Continued from April PIONEER)

Samuel and Anna Woods were in Wilson Co., Tenn. 1800-1806 and then they moved to Preble Co., Ohio with a great many of Anna's Purviance relatives. Elder David Purviance, brother of Anna Purviance Woods, was a ruling Elder of the Cane Ridge Presbyterian Church of Cane Ridge, Ky. when in 1803 Barton Stone decided to secede from the Presbyterian Church.

David Purviance united with Stone and the others. In 1806 he bought land in Preble Co., Ohio and in 1807 organized a Campbellite Church with some 20-25 members, most of them having been members of the Cane Ridge, Ky. church, and most of them related to him.

Samuel Woods bought land in Preble Co., Ohio and stayed there until 1815-16. He was already back in Tenn. and living in Giles Co. when he sold his Ohio land in 1816. His oldest son, John P. Woods, married and remained in Preble County. It is possible that his two oldest daughters also remained since their deaths were not recorded in the old Woods bible that belonged to their brother, David Woods. I have not - at this date (1965) - been able to find trace of the two daughters. John P. Woods can be found in the 1830 census of Preble Co., Ohio right next to the name of one of his Purviance uncles.

In Giles Co., Tenn. Deed Book A., p. 205, can be found a deed from John Purviance of Wilson Co., Tenn. (he was father of Anna Woods) to Samuel Woods of the state of Ohio and Preble County, which was registered 25th Sept. 1811. (Indenture made 21 Aug. 1810), 450 acres lying on Indian Creek, a branch of Elk River. William Woods and David Woods (brothers of Samuel Woods) were witnesses.

In 1820 Samuel Woods obtained a grant of land from the State of Tenn. and also bought land in West Tenn. on Obion River located about where McLemoresville, Tenn. stands today. It was in Carroll Co., Tenn., where his brother John and brother William Woods had also bought land. As soon as Samuel Woods was settled in Carroll Co. his father (Capt. Samuel Woods) came to Carroll County and lived with his son until his death in 1825. Shortly after that Samuel sold his property to his son, Samuel P. Woods and his son-in-law, John Kellough. He was a sheriff in Carroll Co., Tenn. for a time, and is mentioned in Court Minutes a number of times. In 1832 he and his wife accompanied his sons: David, Samuel P., and William H., two daughters and their families, his

brother, Oliver; Oliver's three sons and three married daughters; and Dysart Woods, (son of his brother John) to a location which in 1836 became Benton County, Arkansas. Three of the men, including Dysart Woods went back to Tenn. after scouting out the land and then later brought their families out. Samuel and Anna Woods had the following children as shown by the bible that belonged to David Woods, and that is still in the possession of one of his descendants.

(David Woods death was the result of injuries received during the Civil War when Bushwhackers beat him unconscious and burned the bottom of his feet in an effort to make him reveal where he had his money hidden. By the time this incident occurred he had spent it all on support of the families of two of his sons and three of his daughters. His two oldest sons and his three sons-in-law were with the Southern forces so their wives and child-

ren were living with David Woods and his wife. The youngest son who had married a Woods second cousin went to Missouri to his wife's people and joined the Northern Army. One son, (Samuel Newton Woods) and one son-in-law (John R. Bowling) lost their lives during the war.

David Woods was an invalid from the time of this mistreatment until his death a year or so later.

When the majority of the family moved to Arkansas Eleazar Woods remained in Tennessee and settled in Dyer Co., Tenn., where he lived out his life. His first wife was a first cousin. The letters he wrote to the Woods family in Benton County, Ark., were kept by Samuel P. Woods (his brother) and they give us some important documentation on the early Woods family. Mr. Bryce Woods has turned them over to this writer and they have been laminated to preserve them. They will be incorporated into the complete story on Capt. Samuel Woods and his descendants which as soon as it is completed will be placed in the Tennessee State Library and Archives where other documentation on the early Woods family will be added also.

Oliver Woods came to Williamson Co., Tenn. with his father about 1800. His name can be found in the deed books and the record of his marriage in the marriage records of Williamson Co., Tenn. From there he went to Maury, now Giles Co., Tenn. His name shows up in the court minutes and deed records of those two counties. In 1820 when his brothers John and Samuel settled in Carroll Co., Tenn. he moved a little further west into Haywood County, Tenn. There he can be found in the 1830 census record. In 1832 he migrated to what is now Benton County, Ark. with his family; his brother Samuel's family and a nephew or two belonging to another brother. This was before Arkansas became a state. A few years later he sold his land in Arkansas and moved about sixty miles north into an area that a few years later became Lawrence Co., Mo. The 1850 census shows Oliver and Nancy living alone, their children all married and with families of their own. One son, dead by the time of the census, (Samuel Newton Woods). Oliver was both teacher and farmer.
