

SALOON-KEEPER KILLS A BOY


Newport, March 15 .- In retaliation for being wounded by a youth, Eunice King, a few weeks ago, Bob Simmons, a saloon keeper of Newport, Monday night shot and killed King, who had been released on bail from jail that afternoon.

The killing occured in Peter Anderson's saloon, a block away from the saloon of L. L. Bowen & Co., in which Simmons is a partner. Simmons fired four shots with a 45 calibre revolver. every shot taking effect.

The killing occurred at 9:20 p. m. Simmons immediately went to the office of a justice of the peace, where he remained until taken into custody.

King, who had been in the county jail for shooting Simmons, was released Monday afternoon at 6 o'clock on bond of \$1,000. After his release, King went to the saloon of Anderson. When Simmons passed the saloon and saw King in there, he went in add shot him.

A few weeks ago Simmons ejected King from his saloon. King lay in wait for him with a shotgun, and as passed an alley fired both barrels. The gun was loaded with bird shot, some of them entering Simmons leg, but not producing serious wounds.





There is a feeling of sorrow in the hearts of our people today over the death of Eunice King, who was foully murdered Monday evening at 9:30 by Robert T. Simmons, who shot him killing him instantly.

Eunice was an orphan boy, being raised by Mrs. Peter Anderson of this city, who has always been a mother to him. He was only 18 years of age and his untimely death has caused much sorrow and hard feelings. He was of a genial nature, a good disposition, and generally liked.

The funeral will be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Anderson, Wednesday afternoon at 2:30, when all friends are invited. Burial at Walnut Grove.



NEWPORT, March 16.—Robert C. Simmons, a saloonist, 50 years old, shot and killed Eunice King, a lad 18 years old, here last night as a result of a difficulty which the men had in Simmons' saloon about two weeks ago, when King shot Simmons in the leg. King, who had been in jail ever since the first difficulty, was released yesterday on a bond of \$1,000.

At 9 o'clock last night, while he was taking a drink in Peter Anderson's salcon, Simmons entered, and without warning began firing on the boy, who fell dead in his tracks, pierced through the body with five bullets from the pistol used by Simmons. King had been clerking about in various stores and had neither father nor mother living. Simmons is of a prominent family and is a brother of H. S. Simmons, county judge. He was arrested immediately after the shooting and locked up. Coroner Henry Grant summoned a jury and will investigate the killing.

The original trouble between Simmons and the boy occurred two weeks ago, when the latter had a fight with someone in Simmons' saloon. Simmons ordered him out and took sides with the other party in the difficulty. It is said that King went to his room and, returning, fired two shots from a double-barrel gun at Simmons, one charge of which struck Simmons in the leg. Simmons has a wife, but no children. King was unmarried.

The next is my great Uncle Silvy, Dr. Watson's youngest son (about 8 at the time his father was killed). Silvy shot at Uncle Bob in the **summer of 1916** when the latter was visiting family in Springfield MO. Luckily Uncle Bob was not seriously injured. **This is the source of the "Dad, I tried" on Silvy's tombstone**. We will probably never know everything about the Dr. Watson shooting, but our theory is that Silvy, being the youngest, was the most affected by it, and perhaps couldn't understand the complexities of the situation. My grandfather was very close to his sister Margery and didn't seem to have any issues with Uncle Bob, nor did my mom or her siblings, so that lends credence to the shooting being somewhat in self defense, and most of the family not blaming Bob.
